"We offer a friendly atmosphere and a wonderful opportunity to meet people, make friends, enjoy team social activities, all while being productive and making a worthwhile contribution to our community," she says.

Gloy adds "and it beats sitting at home in front of a TV or computer screen".

Gloy, Dawn and Marjorie spend every Thursday afternoon working out the back, unpacking boxes of donated second-hand items, sorting and preparing them for display in the shop front.

"Dawn is an expert at polishing silver, so she gets all the silver jobs," Gloy said. "I particularly enjoy fine china, so I always enjoy finding that whenever. We're back room girls, whereas Marj will happily work out the front also. She's a go-betweener girl."

Marjorie says volunteering in the opportunity shop provides a lot of satisfaction.

"I also wanted to thank St John for the service's support and help for my late-husband Bert when we needed them. St John was always there for us."

The local St John Opportunity Shops are located at 39 Oxford Street, Levin, and at 4 Arthur Street, Otaki. Proceeds from items sold are used to support local St John ambulance services and community health initiatives such as health shuttles, Caring Caller and youth programmes.

What is the Adult Day Centre?

What is the Adult Day Centre? Some 28 years ago a group of concerned citizens established that there was an urgent need in Levin for a day care centre to provide respite for full time family carers who were looking after loved ones 24/7. This challenge was taken up by the Levin Baptist church, which set up a working committee and with the aid of a Government grant altered their premises to provide a functional, warm and safe facility in the church lounge.

Over time we have broadened our horizons and welcomed the lonely, the socially isolated and the disadvantaged into the centre.

Originally the centre was run completely by volunteers but as numbers increased the load became too much and so a centre co-ordinator was employed to organise the daily programme and oversee the transport arrangements of getting the guests to and from the centre. A cook was also employed to prepare a two-course hot meal, along with morning and afternoon teas. The centre operates two days per week on Mondays



and Wednesdays from 9.00am to 3.00pm. Transport is provided to and from the Centre for the guests as required.

Horowhenua helps NZSG celebrate its 50th anniversary by Merv Judge

Genealogy has been one of the fastest growing hobbies in recent years, with thousands of people up and down the country bitten by the bug.

It wasn't always so. When the founders of organised genealogy research in Levin joined NZSG they became members number 1932, 1950 and 1959. But a new

member nowadays will have a membership number somewhere over 26,000.

The New Zealand Society of Genealogists celebrates its 50th birthday this year.

Local genealogists are marking the occasion with an event being held in TeTakere on Tuesday 15th August.

All current and past members of NZSG or the former Levin Branch of NZSG* are invited to attend.

The event will kick off at midday with a Welcome (Carole Smith) sharing of memories by some of the foundation members of the Levin Branch (led by Gloy Deadman and Tom Hayes), followed by lunch, and then livestreaming of speeches from the national event in Auckland.

Genealogists here in Levin played a central role in the early days of NZSG as the national centre for research of cemetery, international and other microfiche records held in their homes.

After working out of a succession of shops, church halls and houses over the years, since 2012 our local genealogists have found a permanent home in Te Takere, and have assisted hundreds of people at the Help Desk in the Heritage Room, a service which is available Monday to Friday.

The organisers of the local 50th celebration have looked through old minutes, albums and other records to contact as many former members as possible.

"Sometimes it's easier to find ancestors from 200 years ago then it is to track down living people!" said Gloy.

"Sadly, about 60 of our former members are known to have deceased, but we have sent out over 120 invitations. There are still a few dozen former members that we would love to have come but haven't been able to track down".

*Since 2010 the local genealogy group has been Horowhenua Family History Group.

It has been a funny season for gardeners, Rain, Floods, Wind, and a bit of warm weather thrown in just to keep us interested.

Glasshouse Update

I gave my Glasshouse a good tidy up after the Tomatoes had done their thing, only for Mike & Jackie to give me a couple more to put in over the Winter as bit of a trial. I can report that at the time of writing this, they are thriving. If they ripen, a real bonus, if not I have not lost anything, just a bit of my time. I also put in 2 each of Cabbage & Cauliflower. They are also doing well. Mike & Jackie went over to Aussie to their Daughter Pam & her Husband Pedro, and prior to them going Mike put in Cabbages & Cauliflowers about the same time as I did. I will let you know the results in my next edition of Elderberries. I don't want to eat humble pie again this year. They were from my seedlings, so they will be good !!!!!

My Gardens


I have all of my Garlic in, (201 Cloves). I have put them into 5 different beds this year, hopefully to repel a repeat of lasts years rust, which I might add affected not just me, but so many people in different regions. Fingers crossed for a good crop. I put in close to 300 Cloves last year, and just my April planting was usable. My target for next year is 500. My main project over the colder months has been to get my gardens into tip top condition ready for Spring planting. I call this period my, "Money Period", as that is when the picked vegetables get made into my Jams, Relishes, Pickles, and bottling. They are loaded up with my homemade Compost, Horse Manure courtesy of Trevor my lawn mowing guy, Grass clippings etc. They are looking really good. Even Mike made a comment. Praise indeed.

What To Grow

You may think that the vegetables to grow are more Spring vegetables, and you would be right!!!. Your Winter garden should be well

under way by now, so I thought getting ready for Spring is more applicable.

Beetroot: One of my most favourite Vegetables to grow. I bottle mine, but equally nice as a Vegetable on it's own.



Capsicum: Start off in pots and transplant when about 4-6 inches high into the garden or glasshouse.

Celery: A must have for any salad, whether Lettuce, Potato, or a Coleslaw. Nice also on its own with salt sprinkled on.

Chillies: I would suggest starting off in a small seed pot and planting in the glasshouse or sheltered part of the garden. 1 or 2 plants will be ample for an average family.

Lettuce: A Spring garden without Lettuce growing, is like fish & chips without salt. My favourite is the Cos Lettuce. It looks great and tastes even better. Has a nice crunch to it.

Potatoes: New Potatoes for Xmas Day will have to be put in around late September to Early October. Just being on my own, I put in an early variety (Jersey Benne), not worrying about tradition. I can't resist digging a root, cooking with Mint, and drenching it in butter, salt & pepper. Very hard to beat.

Tomatoes: I grow just 3 varieties, Beefsteak, Moneymaker, and Italian (or Roma). The Beefsteak and Moneymaker are for my Relishes, and Pickle, and the Italian or Roma are for my "World Famous In Foxton" Tomato Soup, and my Savoury Tomato.

The sound of the magpies in the macrocarpa trees bring me sleepily awake. I lie still listening to them as the dimness dissipates and our three beds in the big room are revealed.

Soon breakfast warms our insides, and thick jerseys, jeans and gumboots insulate us as we step out into an autumn day. Dampness rises



from the ground and sun is kept from us until we are clear of the house set among the trees and head towards the wild part. As always Kim comes with us, her wagging tail propelling her sturdy pale-gold body over the grass.

Our route is familiar but imagination makes each foray an adventure, especially when we reach the gateway to 'the gully'. We pause here where the ground drops away into a pine-needley gulf that is difficult to descend and even harder to climb out of. It is still and sunless enough to be foreboding. So this time we remain above it, feeling a different kind of awe as our eyes are drawn upwards by the immense height of the pines lining the path before us. The wind pushes against us, roars through the gully and sweeps up through the trees. Transfixed, we stare heavenward.

"It feels like God is going to come down from the sky," says the youngest of us.

At the end of the path we reach the paddocks and follow the creek, circling back along the fringe of our domain. We skirt the occasional flaccid woollen mounds lying near the water, disturbing in their lifelessness, and arrive back near the gully gate. Off to one side there is a row of macrocarpas. At the nearest end I find one that, just a couple of feet above the ground, has formed a hollow within the surrounding branches. It is shallow enough to provide a place to sit for two of us if we squat with knees almost touching. Dried foliage lines the hollow and rough bark supports my back. It is a place just to be; a lull in the midst of reality where it is just us and the tree.

I perch there dreamily until my nest-mate gets fidgety and we can no longer ignore Kim's wish to keep moving. I climb down from my nook. One day I will leave it for the last time, but forever afterwards the cry of magpies will take me back.
