- 5. Adult Learning: All adults able to access learning opportunities within our community

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What is Education Horowhenua's Role?

Education Horowhenua acts primarily as a forum for education service providers, Council, business, community and iwi groups and government agencies to:


- Establish and nurture a collective vision for successful education for our community
- Co-ordinate initiatives and plan collectively to strengthen the provision of education in the Horowhenua
- Provide a vehicle for the Council and government agencies to work across the Horowhenua on initiatives that strengthen education outcomes
- Share information and build networks across the Horowhenua and with external partners
- Identify strategic issues and opportunities and act as a catalyst for new initiatives where there is a gap in current provision
- Find and support others to take ownership of initiatives and provide ongoing encouragement and support

What are the key objectives that need to be achieved, and how?

Early Childhood (0-5 years)


Pre schoolers are enrolled in ECE and have an easy transition to school.

- Ensure Incredible Years programme is utilised to maximum capacity
- Expand access to Reading Together programme to ECE
- Supporting parents and children under 2 into the education system

Primary School (5-12 years)

Primary school students are improving their achievement.

- Expand access to Reading Together programme
- Expand access to Accelerated Literacy Learning programmes
- Expand access to Accelerated Numeracy Learning programmes
- Coordinated opportunities for localised National training
- Access to Professions (writers/artists/scientists) in residence
- Improving transition to secondary
- Expand access to Incredible Years Programme
- Support Māori medium education



All young people in the Horowhenua have worthwhile qualifications that enhance transition.

- Enhanced He Kakano across all secondary schools
- Access to Professions (writers/artists/scientists) in residence
- Role models (Raising expectations and motivation)
- Whānau/family: Understanding NCEA
- Collaborative opportunities with tertiary providers
- Support networks to facilitate vocational and learning pathways
- Enable students to successfully transition from secondary school
- Encourage and support the development of young leaders







Adults (25 years and above)

Education opportunities are available that engage the adult community in education.

- Community educations classes are available through Te Takere (Chalkle)
- Develop and support opportunities to meet the needs of adult learners
- Collaborative opportunities with tertiary providers

Family/Whānau

Opportunities for Families/Whānau to engage in formal and informal education are strong.

- Include a greater emphasis on education outcomes through programmes provided through government agencies and contracted providers e.g. Whānau Ora
- Expand Positive Parenting
 Programme
- Training whānau/families in Reading Together programme
- Expand Horowhenua Pasifika Education Initiative (Family coordinators)

- Expand SPACE Programme
- Expand access to Computers on Homes Programme
- Māori immersion education
- Expand access to Incredible
 Years Programme
- Expand access to SPACE
 Programme
- Support the provision of NCEA information to whanau/families
