# **Community Services Report April 2017**

The purpose of this report is to give an update and overview on the current Community Wellbeing Committee activities occurring that relate to the Community Wellbeing Strategy as well as provide an update on Community Service Programme activities of the Horowhenua District that directly contribute towards the Community Wellbeing Strategy priority areas.

# Community Wellbeing Strategy

Youth Voice, Older Persons Network and Education Horowhenua have all been asked to consider what actions they will undertake within their particular target population to contribute to the goal of eliminating family violence. This is on their agenda for next meetings.

# Families with Children

Recent achievements

Learn to Swim participation, year to date:

Levin: 489Foxton: 44Total: 533

Over March, 2 Council officers from Community Services Team visited local schools and community groups promoting the Go Active Kids TRYathlon in what was called "Go Active Bootcamps". Each Bootcamp consisted of a 15 minute talk about the Go active Kids TRYathlon, what 3 activities make up a Triathlon, how these sports relate to other sports e.g. rugby, netball, soccer. This was followed by a 40 minute workout, with both individual and team activities. We had a great response from everyone that participated in these sessions:

- o Ohau School x2 sessions 100 students in total
- Levin Intermediate x1 session 40 Students
- Shannon Youth group 25 participants
- Levin North School 42 Students
- St Joseph's Catholic School x 2 sessions 100 students in total
- Fairfield School x 2 sessions 102 Students in total

All schools in our district were contacted and offered Go Active Bootcamps; however some did not take up the opportunity for whatever reason.

We held 3 final Go Active TRY Athlon events, one in Shannon with 40 participants, and one in Foxton with 28 participants and final in Levin with 39 participants. Youth Voice helped out with the Levin event and organized and ran the barbeque.

# Youth

Recent achievements

Youth Voice met seven (7) times

Council is a partner in the delivery of a project related to the 'Rethink Teen Drinking and Social Supply' (RTD's) Committee, being coordinated by Public Health Unit of MCDHB. Council efforts are particularly focused on the youth promotion activity, 'Hard-core Horowhenua'; a three year project.

In this initiative, Council Officers recently practically supported a tour of the district with youth development professionals, and inspirational speakers Richie Hard-core and Ramon Narayan, providing social talks to students' yrs. 11-13 about alcohol and lifestyle.

Priorities for next 2 months:

Holiday programme for young people

 Complete The Get Set (Dress for Success)
 project



Funding for the RTD's committee has been secured from the Health Promotion Agency, and will be used in support of both Hard-core Horowhenua, and other aspects of the teen drinking culture; including a survey of parents related to social supply of alcohol to minors.

Council officers hosted a spoken word, poetry slam writing workshop in the Contact Youth Space where 10 young people came in and wrote their very own poetry and performed back within the group.

Minecraft Club, Code Club, League of legends – continues weekly. Both Minecraft Clubs are currently full and Code Club and League of Legends becoming more popular.

Teen Book Club, still meeting once a month on mezzanine floor in Te Takere. A student worker is starting to take leadership over this activity.

Youth Week Funding – Council was successful in gaining \$750 Ara Taiohi Youth Week funding that will allow local young people to compose an album of original youth music in the recording studio at Te Takere.

The Get Set (Dress for Success) project running in Te Takere assists young people with preparing for employment by helping them with employment skills and with professional clothing for interviews and work. It was launched in the final week of March. A wardrobe will be prepared for participating young people, in April to assist with finding job-appropriate clothing for young people who engage with the initiative, which is funded by the Ministry of Youth Development.

"Shot Bro – Confessions of a depressed bullet": Raukawa Whanau Ora bought Rob and his crew into Te Takere to perform Rob's dark but comedic journey through depression. Around 60 people from the community came and took part.

Lifeguard Training- HDC partnered with Horowhenua Learning Centre to train potential Lifeguard staff for summer period.

From the 24-26 March, two Council staff took 16 young people (including Voice members as well as young people referred from Muaupoko Tribal Authority), on a Civil Defence Emergency Management Training Camp. The Camp was funded by the Ministry of Youth Development, this camp aimed to educate our young leaders on how to respond in an emergency, and also served as a planning space for what role youth could play in the initial response, but also in the recovery phase afterward. The camp was a huge success; there was a huge interest and buy-in from all who attended, and a great deal of personal development occurred as the programme pushed them outside of their comfort zone. In addition to this, as part of the weekend experience, the young men and women



were subject to a mock-earthquake situation. This resulted in them establishing their own Civil Defence Centre at Makahika, and inviting the residents of the Gladstone Road community (who have recently suffered a road-slip) to share a dinner, and to listen to presentations from the young people about the importance of personal and community preparedness. It was great to see the residents of this community really engage with the young people, and to share their experiences about the slip; it made for a very positive and proactive learning experience for everyone involved. Coming away from the camp, Youth Voice members are inspired, and are already preparing some big events and activities relating to Civil Defence. A section of the new Local Welfare Plan will also be put aside for of the role youth in an emergency, with lessons learned at the camp being the source of the content.

# Older People

Recent achievements

Older Persons Network has met seven (7) times this year. The next meeting is scheduled for 20 April 2017.

Age on the Go Expo Working Group is being established for Expo planning in 2017.

The Working Group established to facilitate further discussion regarding "Age-Friendly Cities and Communities" by Older Persons Network has met twice o far 8 February 2016 and 8 March 2017 and are presently formulating a framework document that can monitor and measure the efforts of the OPN over the next 3 years.

Rehabilitation Programmes at LAC have included Aqua Rehab and Move Well.

Ageing Well - Wellness Week; including nutrition, exercise, health, illness, and lifestyle information. This will occur from February 20-24 2017 at the Levin Aquatics Centre, and the Foxton Aquatics Centre. This will also mark the re-launch of rehabilitation programmes for the centres.

# **People with Disabilities**

Recent achievements

Disability Sector Leadership Network has met three (3) times this year.

A Disability Sector Planning Workshop was held on 21 February 2016 with more than 20 groups represented. The critical role the Sector can play in Local Civil Defence and Emergency Preparedness was emphasised. A decision was taken to endorse use of the Life Tube which has subsequently been endorsed by the Disability Leadership Forum; Older Persons Network and the Local Welfare Committee.

Priorities for next 2 months:

Draft Inclusion and Access Plan (Disability Action Plan) prepared.



Inclusion and Access Plan (Disability Action Plan) review commenced, First Consultation took place on 06 March 2017 with Sector Representatives. Further Consultation Focus Groups being held in April/May

# Levin Aquatics

Aqua Rehab remains one of our most popular Aqua programmes. Next term another Aqua Rehab class will be added to the timetable as well as investigations to running this at Foxton Pool.

Move Well dry-land fitness programme operates to a small number of attendees on Tuesdays; promotional options are being explored to enhance public knowledge of the programme.

# Community

Recent achievements

# Levin Aquatics

AquaCise, AquaStick, AquaFit, AquaAdapt and AquaDeep classes are showing a consistent increase in numbers month to month with 530 participants throughout February. Evening classes are again showing growth with increasing participants in AquaFit and AquaStick.

Levin: Bootcamp numbers increased over 20% from February to March with 74 participants – Monday nights proving especially popular.

A total of 718 participants took part in classes over the unit in March.

Horowhenua Community Service Reference Group has met twice (Objectives - increase community awareness of Council's community service delivery across district; increase opportunities for community participation in Council delivered services, programmes and events; improve range, reach and relevance of Council community service delivery). Recent meeting unanimously endorsed fundraising to provide a Community Trailer for low cost / no cost to streets and neighbourhoods across the district to foster social connectedness and community resilience.

- 19 February a Tea Dance at Te Takere accompanied by Manawatu Jazz Club's MJC Big Band.
- 21 February is a Family History Research Day, when staff and volunteers will be at Te Takere, on hand to help people search databases to find out more about their family heritage
- 22 February is Men's Hobby Day, during which local hobbyists will display and demonstrate their skills, crafts and projects to the public.
- 26 February is the free monthly Sunday Concert at Te Takere, featuring the Rodger Fox Quintet and vocalist Erna Ferry performing jazz and blues classics.

Priorities for next 2 months:

Consultation on Arts, Culture, History and Heritage Plan

Our big library event "Festival of Stories" 8-14 May, is well on its' way. With the weeks' timetable becoming populated with 47 events involving 17 invited guests. This includes activities and events in Foxton and Shannon. Relationships with 24 organisations or individuals have been developed. 8-14 May is looking to be an exciting programme celebrating stories in a way that is inclusive of all members of our community.

In March there was a Foxton Aquathon; a showcase of all the aquatics fitness classes on offer.

Shannon Library showcased an exhibition of acrylic on canvas by Victoria Webster.

Te Takere's exhibition space featured David Saunders, Brett Keno and Shivaun Hogan as well as Oamaru Stone Sculptors from the Hutt Valley.

Te Takere's March Sunday concert included internationally acclaimed New Zealand delta blues solo artist Bullfrog Rata.

Te Takere's March Friday concert series included Max Lyons and Levin's own Liam Burgess.

expressionist exhibition is being planned for July at Te Takere, with a funding application currently sitting with the English Arts Council in the United Kingdom. The topic of the exhibition is "Faith" and community conversation events are being planned in support.

A Funding application for Matariki celebrations has been submitted to the Mazda Foundation and a further application is being prepared for Te Puni Kokiri, with partner agency Muaupoko Tribal Authority.

Planning is underway for all remaining community hub events in the financial year, including Artsmash expo (5/6 May), NZ Music Month (May) and a ticketed Comedy Cabaret with Zane & Degge (16 June).
