It's five months since I started my new journey as Council's Chief Executive, motivated to make a difference and serve the Horowhenua community. I believe that organisational culture determines any organisation's success. For me it starts and ends with leadership and leadership is all about our people. Therefore, I've taken the time to understand Council's challenges and opportunities and along with the Executive Leadership Team and wider staff, we are committed to focusing on people, partnerships and priorities. It's a long road ahead and I remain enthusiastic about the journey we're embarking on – a journey focused on enabling what matters to you, our community. A future where Council, Iwi, local businesses and our community work together to find innovative ways to improve service delivery to serve the Horowhenua community.

I'm pleased to have gotten the recent evaluation report on the Future of the Levin Landfill Business Case to Council. Whilst the decision has been deferred to the new Council, it has provided direction and the next steps in this challenging and complex matter.

In the short term I'll prepare a briefing paper for the incoming Council, outlining the options associated with the decisions, including risk and cost analysis and any other considerations on whether it should be included in the 2021-2041 Long Term Plan Amendment or the 2024-2044 Long Term Plan. In the long run Council needs to invest and put its weight into developing and driving a broader Waste Minimisation Strategy in partnership with Iwi, hapū and the community. That will ensure we'll make the right decisions not only on the Future of the Levin Landfill but all future service delivery and operations associated with waste services provided by Council.

A priority for us at the moment is the 2022 Local Government Elections. If you're an enrolled voter, you would have received your voter packs in your letterbox. Let us know if you didn't receive it.

If you are not enrolled, it's not too late – you can still request to cast a special vote. We've tried to make it easy for you to vote, you can even vote while doing your shopping. Make sure to return your ballot papers to us before 12 noon on Saturday 8 October 2022. More info on the ballot boxes and special votes on page 4.

The past couple of years have been challenging, and it's easy to feel disconnected from the people and places important to us. This week is Mental Health Awareness Week, and I hope you're doing something this week that will give you joy. It doesn't have to be significant as long as it fills your cup. Whether you're reaching out to someone you have lost contact with, visiting your happy place, reading a book, or doing a coffee catch up. Cooler summers at Jubilee Park

Horowhenua summers are going to be cooler with a new splash pad being built at Jubilee Park, Levin (affectionately known as 'the Donald Duck Park'). Work on the new splash pad and amenity block began on Wednesday 21 September. It will be complete within two months, weather permitting.

A popular water play feature across Aotearoa, splash pads are 'zero depth' fun, which shower, spray, mist and shoot streams of water at users. Designed on a hard, flat surface, as the water splashes onto this surface it is collected, filtered, sanitised and recirculated to keep the water fun flowing in an eco-friendly way.

We consulted with our community in 2020, through the draft Long Term Plan 2021-2041 process, on installing a new aquatic feature as the existing Jubilee Park paddling pool was ageing. This idea was met with great enthusiasm, and funding was allocated in our Long Term Plan 2021-2041 to develop a splash pad and new amenity block for our tamariki and whānau to enjoy. We engaged with local rangatahi to work alongside our contractors for the final splash pad design.

A new amenity block will be established alongside the splash pad, featuring two family changing rooms with baby changing tables, two fully accessible unisex toilets and a plant room for the operation of the splash pad.

The amenity block will replace the existing toilet block, which is no longer up to standard and has reached the end of its life. Mindful of park users and neighbours, we want to keep disruptions to a minimum so have chosen prefabricated units to allow for a short construction time. Our contractors will be onsite from 7.30am to 5pm on weekdays.



Te Takeretanga o Kura-hau-pō turns 10

29 September 2022 marks the 10th anniversary of Te Takeretanga o Kura-hau-pō – Horowhenua's Culture and Community Centre.

Nationally, Te Takeretanga o Kura-hau-pō became a flagship of its kind. A relevant and convenient destination to complement people's lives at home, school and work. Recreational, cultural, learning, digital and social experiences are located in one convenient, modern and accessible facility in the heart of Levin and the wider Horowhenua District. Ten years on, we want to reflect on the name Te Takeretanga o Kura-hau-pō and the mana it has gifted the facility, kaimahi and our wider community.

The meaning of Te Takeretanga is the dispersal of knowledge. The Takere is also the hull of the waka where treasures are kept for safety. Like the hull of the waka, Te Takeretanga o Kura-hau-pō holds many taonga for the benefit of all.

There are many meanings to the word kura, some are as follows:

- Red glowing light
- The hidden knowledge of our ancestors
- Taonga
- Learning place
- Someone or something of chiefly status

The word hau also has many meanings, two of which include:

- An internal energy
- Wind

Through both of these elements, knowledge is sought, maintained and dispersed.

Pō is the transition from the world of darkness to the world of light through knowledge.

Cambridge Street North Wastewater Renewal

Cambridge Street (North) wastewater network are being upgraded to accommodate the growing demand projected for North East Levin and to renew the ageing infrastructure.

The upgrade of this network will both renew the existing pipes and ensure sufficient capacity for growth. It will improve the network performance and ensure the wastewater collection network is reliable and has minimal infiltration, blockages or overflows.

What the works involve

The project is to construct a 530m new wastewater main pipe on Cambridge Street (North) from house number 249 to the Tyne Street intersection.

The works involves deep trenching in the road, laying of new pipe, connecting adjacent households, backfilling the trench and reinstating the road with asphaltic concrete.

Work began on Monday 19 September. Motorists are advised that stop-go signs will operate until the project is completed. We apologise for any inconvenience it might cause.

Spinifex is an indigenous native plant which binds the dunes and reduces erosion.




