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## Get ready for Local Body Elections!

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Council has issued a frank Pre-Election Report governmentation aims to ignite debate amongst candidates and the public in the lead-up to the 2019 Local success Body Elections.

Horowhenua District Council Chief Executive David Clapperton said the report provides some insight into the large and significant role Council plays in everyday life.

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"The report highlights the many challenges and opportunities to come," said Mr Clapperton.

"How will we continue to manage the pressures of a growing population and ensure that growth represents an opportunity?"

The report includes highlights such as maintaining Council's A+ credit rating from Standard & Poor's, preparing for growth and improving relationships with iwi.

It also acknowledges that things haven't always gone our way, including central

government's decision to delay the O2NL Expressway, and the disappointing lack of success in accessing Provincial Growth Fund monies for our district.

"How do we light a fire under O2NL and get it back on track – residents and businesses need certainty and not another lost decade of delays," said Mr Clapperton.

In addition, the report prompts candidates to think about issues that face all of us, such as how we should confront the reality of climate change and its effects.

# Reduced speed limits to come into effect

Reduced speed limits on most rural and rural residential roads in Horowhenua are expected to come into effect following the Council meeting on 14 August.

The changes reduce speed limits on most rural roads to 80 kilometres per hour (km/h) and on most rural residential and unsealed roads to 60 km/h. The 50 km/h speed limit zone will be extended in some areas.

In addition, new variable speed school zones will apply around Levin East School and Waiopehu College; Fairfield School; Levin North School; and Levin School and Levin Intermediate.

Council adopted the changes following public engagement between January and March this year on a district-wide review of rural road speed limits.

New speed limit signs are programmed to be installed within two months of the new speed limits coming into effect.



### Aquatics Horowhenua gets stamp of approval

Aquatics Horowhenua has been admitted to the Register of Exercise Professionals (REPs), a signature mark of quality for fitness centres.

REPs is the recognised industry standard to ensure safe and effective exercise advice in fitness services.

"REPs registration means people in Horowhenua can be confident Aquatics Horowhenua instructors are trained to a high standard with approved qualifications such as AUSTSWIM and Skills Active. As a REPs facility, all our instructors are Registered Exercise Professionals, and as a result we can offer a greater variety of classes and training methods," said Aquatics Programmes and Events Supervisor Lewis Young.

Mr Young said Aquatics Horowhenua was the only public fitness facility outside Auckland and Wellington to achieve REPs status.



## Smoke, but no fire

If you see a smoke-like white vapour rising from the ground on or near your property, Horowhenua Alliance might be in the neighbourhood.

The Alliance is carrying out smoke testing of Levin's sewer system between July and December this year.

Smoke testing involves smoke being pumped into Council's sewers. Crews then monitor where the smoke escapes the sewer system.

Project Management and Design Engineer Thushantha Heenkenda said Council uses smoke testing to locate breaks and defects in the sewer system.

"We'll use information from the tests to improve sewer services, help plan future public infrastructure projects, and potentially reduce costs. Depending on the findings, we may also make immediate repairs to the sewer system where needed," he said.

Mr Heenkenda said the smoke is actually a harmless vapour.

"It's safe for humans, animals and plants, and it leaves no residue or stains. It does have an odour, but in places with adequate ventilation you'll be able to see and smell it for only a few minutes," he said.

Residents will be notified by mail 48 hours before smoke testing starts in their neighbourhood, and fire and police services have been informed.

## Recycling contamination hits record low

Levels of rubbish contaminating the kerbside recycling Horowhenua District Council collects have hit record lows since the new kerbside recycling service was introduced.

Environmental Engineer Ryan Hughes said Council sends recycling to a materials recovery facility in Palmerston North for sorting and processing, and levels of contamination in our recycling are independently audited at the facility.

"Audit results from July show that contamination levels average 2.27% so far, compared with an average of around 18% before the recycling changes were introduced," he said.

Mr Hughes thanked the community for the fantastic result and encouraged people to keep up the good work.

"Managing levels of contamination is important because the materials recovery facility can reject a whole truckload of recycling if it contains too much non-recyclable material. Everyone needs to 'do their bit' by recycling correctly to prevent this from happening and help to protect our environment."

As part of the new kerbside recycling service, a three-level system is in place for contamination of recycling bins with rubbish and other non-recyclable material.

#### The recycling three-level system

A three-level system operates for wheelie bins contaminated with rubbish and other non-recyclable materials:

- Level 1 Contamination The first time your recycling wheelie bin contains minor amounts of non-recyclable material, you'll get a Level 1 sticker on your bin and we'll provide you with information to help you recycle right. Your bin will be emptied.
- Level 2 Contamination If we are unable to collect your recycling because of major contamination with non-recyclable materials, or minor contamination occurs for the second time in six weeks, you'll get a Level 2 sticker on your bin and we'll provide you with information to help you recycle right. Your bin will not be emptied.
- Level 3 Contamination In cases of serious repeat contamination with non-recyclable material, your kerbside recycling collection service may be suspended indefinitely or your recycling bin may be removed. You'll need to contact us to have your service resumed. You will still be able to take your recycling to a recycling station.

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### Refugees tell their stories at resettlement workshop

Wajeeha Akbari was just 20 years old when she fled her home country of Afghanistan with her four month old. It would be another 18 months before she found out that New Zealand would be her family's new home.

"Everything was different but I am so happy in Palmerston North."

Ms Akbari was one of two former refugees to speak to the more than 35 attendees at a Refugee Resettlement workshop held at Horowhenua District Council last week.

From June 2020 Levin can expect approximately 90 former refugees per year to call Horowhenua home.

Horowhenua District Council Community Engagement Manager Lacey Winiata says since Levin was announced as a new resettlement location earlier this year Council has had numerous requests for information and offers of support for the incoming residents.

"Our community is very welcoming and compassionate but we're also aware of

the challenges ahead. The workshop brought together members of community organisations, volunteer groups and central government to identify what support we already have, the gaps and address some of those challenges."

Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment officials hosted the workshop, with topic experts facilitating conversations on housing, education, health, employment and community engagement.

The Ministry expected to announce the provider of the resettlement service next month. In the meantime, Mrs Winiata says Council will persistently advocate for our iwi partners to be included and to work with organisations and service providers.

"While we may not have all the answers yet, we will continue to work alongside our partners and community to ensure Horowhenua is welcoming and has services available for our new and current residents."
