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New Council and Community Board sworn-in

Horowhenua's Elected Members attended their first official meeting for the 2019-2022 triennium last week.

The Swearing-In Ceremony was held in Council Chambers last Wednesday evening, with most elected members attending alongside their family and friends.

Earlier in the month the newly elected members had been welcomed into Council's main office with a pōwhiri.

New District Mayor Bernie Wanden was the first to be sworn-in and was presented with the Mayoral Chains from Council's Chief Executive David Clapperton.

Council welcomed three new Councillors including Sam Jennings (Levin ward), Robert Ketu (Miranui ward) and David Allan (Kere Kere ward). Cr Allan had previously served on Council and the Foxton Community Board.

Newly elected Councillor Todd Isaacs (Levin Ward) put in his apologies and would be sworn-in at Council's next Ordinary meeting later this month.

He will be joined by returning Councillors Jo Mason and Wayne Bishop who also couldn't attend the Inaugural meeting.

At the meeting Council Mayor Wanden announced Cr Mason as his Deputy Mayor, following consultation with his fellow Councillors.

"It has been a pleasure working with Jo over the last term, both on Council and on the Hearings Committee. The way she chaired those committees, her empathy with the public and her commitment to the role signalled to me that she has the capability and the qualities to do an outstanding job as Deputy Mayor".

Also sworn-in were the Foxton Community Board members including new members Ngaire Newland and Trevor Chambers. They joined returning board members David Roache, Tricia Metcalf and John Girling.

Mr Roache was then voted in as Board chairperson and Ms Metcalf as deputy chairperson for the second triennium in a row.

Council's next Ordinary meeting will occur on 13 November 2019, with the next Foxton Community Board meeting taking place on 25 November 2019.



Love Your Loo

Horowhenua District Council is asking residents to Love Your Loo.

This comes after a number of items have been flushed down the drain causing blockages.

Horowhenua Alliance Manager Neil Cherry said on average his staff were attending 5 pump station blockages a week.

“When we have staff spending more than 10 hours a week, clearing items out of the pump station that should not have been flushed, it is costing the ratepayer thousands of dollars a year”.

Wet wipes were the biggest offender, however staff were clearing blockages caused by a range of items including garden hose fittings, sanitary pads and uncapped syringes with exposed needles.

“5 blockages have been caused by underwear. Considering these are cleared by hand, it is pretty disgusting for our staff to have to deal with” Mr Cherry said.

Council was hopeful that once residents learnt what was and wasn't flushable and how much of a pain on the drain these items were causing, people's habits would change.

“We want Horowhenua to love their loo and to think of what they are flushing down the drain. The easiest way to remember was to think of the 3 P's; only flush paper, poo and pee!” Mr Cherry said.

Part of the challenge, Mr Cherry acknowledged, was that many products claimed to be flushable.

“Just because something can go down the toilet, doesn't mean that it should or that it is safe to do so. Wet wipes do not disintegrate or break down in the same way toilet paper does”.



Horowhenua gets second Green Flag



A second Horowhenua park has received an international award, making it only one of 26 in the country.

Last year Thompson House Gardens was awarded a Green Flag, and this year Driscoll Reserve in Manakau was also awarded the distinction.

Green Flag Awards recognise and reward well-managed parks and green spaces, and aim to ensure everyone has access to good quality green spaces that meet the needs of the community.

Applicants for the Green Flag are judged against 27 criteria, and must demonstrate a good understanding of the park site and its users, as well as an active management plan.

Council's Property and Parks Manager Arthur Nelson said the Green Flag scheme is considered an international benchmark for good management of outdoor recreational spaces.

“To have received two Green Flags, in a district as small as Horowhenua, is an honour and demonstrates that we are creating spaces that meet the needs of our community”.

The Green Flags scheme is administered for the UK Ministry of Housing, Communities & Local Government by UK-based environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy, which sub-licences it to the New Zealand Recreation Association in this country.



Pipes under Levin's main roundabout to be upgraded

Old water pipes under Levin's main roundabout are getting replaced, providing more capacity in the water network.

Residents and visitors will find contractors beginning work on the Queen Street/ Cambridge Street roundabout later this month.

Horowhenua Alliance Project Manager Gerry O'Neill said it wasn't enough to just repair the old pipes.

“Repairs may remove defects for the short-term but it will not necessarily solve the issues long term. Replacing them now also allows us to provide for future demand”.

The Alliance will have open trenches to access and remove the old pipes and will

also be undertaking direct drilling where possible.

Mr O'Neill said the roads will remain open most of the time, however there will be occasions when it will be restricted to one lane and footpaths will be closed.

“We are asking our community to avoid the roundabout during this period, if they can. There will be times when the road will be narrow or it takes longer to get around the roundabout”.

Alliance staff were looking at options that would minimise the impact on the community and local businesses.

Work is expected to be completed in December 2019.

Feedback sought on Horowhenua Integrated Transport Strategy

The strategy to oversee the planning, investment and delivery of transport-related infrastructure in Horowhenua for the next 30 years has reached its next milestone.

Public comments will be sought on the vision and principles of the Horowhenua Integrated Transport Strategy (HITS), along with viewpoints on potential projects.

The vision of the draft strategy is to provide Horowhenua with a safe, functional, innovative, integrated, multimodal and sustainable transport system that supports a thriving, healthy and growing community and enhances the visitor experience.

Principal Policy Advisor Cynthia Ward said the vision was created following public and stakeholder engagement earlier this year.

“Essentially, HITS will be a strategy that allows Horowhenua to take concerted and purposive actions in terms of transport,” said Mrs Ward. “It will help give effect to the objectives of the Horowhenua Growth Strategy 2040 and Levin Town Centre Strategy while supporting the investment in increasing public transport options.”

Mrs Ward said the purpose of the engagement process is to seek public, stakeholder and partner feedback to see if we've got the focus right and to start a conversation about our focus going forward.

“There are many projects that will need to be undertaken, some we can do ourselves and others that will require NZTA and Horizons Regional Council funding or support. We need to hear from the public as to what is

most important in their minds so that we can focus on those areas as we work towards achieving a safer, productive, user friendly transportation network with increased options for our residents to get around.

The HITS strategy takes into account the future Ōtaki to North of Levin Expressway and Council's Long Term Plan.

Let Me Be Myself

The ground-breaking Anne Frank exhibition – ‘Let Me Be Myself’ has opened in Foxton.

The dynamic exhibition created by the Anne Frank House in Amsterdam has already visited 80 countries, and has been seen by more than 10 million people globally.

The Oranjehof national Dutch museum is proud to host the exhibition, in the Te Awahou Nieuwe Stroom Gallery.

“This is a very important exhibition for us,” says Yolande van de Wetering, Co-Chair of the Oranjehof Dutch Connection Museum Trust. “I grew up in an era, when the story of Anne Frank and her diary was still very much front of mind.”

“The horrors of World War II and the 5-year German occupation were fresh in everybody's memories in the Netherlands. Families would talk about their personal experiences, as many had been traumatised. In total some 250,000 Dutch people died – or one in every 40 people. And that included more than 100,000 Jews who were deported, and never returned from the death camps.”

“Educating the younger generations about the ultimate consequences of racism is still very relevant today,” says Yolande.

The Exhibition

The Diary of Anne Frank captures the real-life story of a young girl, in hiding with her family from the Nazis, in an attic in Amsterdam.

The Exhibition arrived in New Zealand in 2018, and opened at the Auckland War Memorial Museum in January where it engaged over 35,000 visitors in just three short months.

Using a combination of excerpts from Anne Frank's famous diary, historical artefacts, pictures, video and testimony, the exhibition walks you through the life of the Frank family and the history of the era. It also engages visitors in a discussion about how the same themes affect our modern world.

Drawing on the experiences of teenagers today, the exhibition talks about disability, prejudice, homophobia and racism in the 21st century. It challenges the visitor to examine their own core, moral values.


Additional material – including a testimony from a Māori boy and a British immigrant girl – bring the New Zealand experience into sharp focus.

A specific education programme for schools, designed by the Anne Frank House, is part of this exhibition that aims to promote tolerance and good citizenship in New Zealand.

Translation into Te Reo Māori

Anne Frank's The Diary of a Young Girl has recently been translated into Māori by Te Haumihiata Mason: Te Rātaka a Tētahi Kōhine. The Diary will be available at the exhibition.

At the launch of the book, Te Haumihiata addressed Anne Frank directly: “Your honesty and the hardships you experienced guided my translation of your diary. You died young, but your words have lived on, and will forever continue to inspire the world.”
