Good Morning,

In November last year, you provided feedback on various concepts as part of a Feasibility Study on Foxton Pool. The feedback received demonstrated the importance that the community places on aquatic provision in Foxton with 676 responses to the proposed concepts.

On Wednesday 16th March, Councillors adopted the draft Long Term Plan Consultation Document. The purpose of the Long Term Plan 2021-2041 Consultation Document is to get your feedback to help Council set out what we are going to do over the next 20 years.

One of the key topics in the 2021-41 Long Term Plan is the future of Foxton Pool. Your feedback provided in November last year has directly help shape the options for consideration. The Consultation Document asks the community to consider five options. All of the options have been quantity surveyed and operational modelling completed to help inform future decision making. The options are:

- Option 1: Indoor and Outdoor Leisure Pool
- Option 2: Basic All-year pool
- Option 3: Seasonal Outdoor Leisure Pool
- Option 4: Seasonal Outdoor Basic Pool
- Option 5: Permanently Close Facility

The purpose of the email today is to let you know that the submission period is now open and to encourage you to have your say – the submissions received through this period will assist Council when it comes to making a decision on the future of the facility. It's important that the community is heard when considering the pools future and I encourage as many people as possible to take the time to complete a submission.



Further submission on infrastructure

Levin Water Supply

My submission on Horowhenua’s water supply infrastructure is driven by a concern for the Ohau River’s ability to provide a reliable and sustainable supply for the growing region.

Many of the points below have been noted in the 2021-2041 Infrastructure Strategy; I wish to emphasise the importance of a sustainable water management approach that alleviates the stresses placed on the taonga of our river.

1. Water-take sustainability; the limits of the river's water abstraction capacity.
If the Horowhenua socio-economic population projections are accurate for year 14 (2034/35) then daily water usage per person at current rates (300 l/p/d) would create a demand for water twice the current summer (low flow) daily abstraction limit.
If we are to encourage new housing development with population growth with the subsequent water demand (e.g. Taraika), we do need an alternative source for our water. The WTP is well equipped to handle variable water sources – it can cope with turbidity, organics, micro-organisms, etc.
Bore water sourcing needs to be actively pursued – this secondary source may eventually become Horowhenua’s primary source.
2. re-evaluating the present water abstraction technology - the existing system requires river bed damaging activities. This entails the environmental vandalism of having 4 or more scarifications per year - especially undesirable at the height of summer and low flow – as evidenced by this sequence of images from the last scarification event:



If we are to persist with abstracting water in this manner, the intake mechanism should be upgraded to not require this kind of damaging activity.

3. Gravel extraction activities upstream by 3rd parties, (arguably) causing water abstraction issues by aggravating the water intake clogging issues with the present design. This has been previously canvassed in the public arena but very much unresolved.
4. Rain water tanks for individual properties. On the grounds of resilience and resource use minimisation. At present we treat the water to optical-grade purity, then flush it down a toilet or water a garden with it...and some of us then buy bottled water to drink instead.

Topic: New Surf Club Building

Summary

A new surf club building is proposed to replace the existing building which is no longer fit for purpose. The new building will be up to two stories and 500m², located overlooking the main activity areas on the beach, seaward and slightly south of the current building. Its primary purpose is for lifesaving activity, with community activity permitted, commercial activity, private functions are largely excluded. These conditions are set out in the Designation. Funding is now the main impediment to getting the new surf club built.

- **We support the construction of a new Surf Club building at Waitarere Beach.**
- **We support the allocation of funds in the draft LTP for the construction of a new surf club building and associated works at Waitarere Beach.**
- **We request that the timing of the allocations of the funds in the LTP be brought forward to Year 1 (21/22) and 2 (22/23) of the LTP, so that construction can be completed by late 2022 / early 2023.**
- **We support council ownership of the new surf club building**
- **We request that a Joint Club / HDC working group is established**

Background and future of Surf lifesaving

The volunteer Surf lifesaving movement in New Zealand dates back over 110 year, with a goal of preventing drowning on our beaches. In the decade to 2020 volunteer lifeguards throughout NZ saved over 10,000 lives. Surf lifesaving is unique amongst many other organisations in that Prevention is at its core, (the ambulance at the top of cliff) with over 1,000,000 preventative action, and 20,400 first aid responses being undertaken in the same period. (*source SLSNZ*)

The Levin-Waitarere Surf lifesaving club dates back to the 1940's with parts of the current building dating back to the 1950's, with further additions in the 1970s and 1980s.

The facility as it stands today was built in several stages. What was the ground floor, is now the basement area, after sand inundated the original ground floor. The building is now well past the end of the useful life and is no longer safe or fit for purpose. The cost to complete any structural work to the existing building is substantial. In addition, the location of the existing building is now too distant from the active area of the beach due to accretion of the dunes, and is essentially in an unsuitable location for the purpose of carrying out lifeguard activities.

Over the past 10 years the Surf Club along with Council have undertaken planning work on a replacement building, with hundreds of volunteer and council hours being poured into the project. This resulted in the granting of a designation for a new surf club building at a commissioner hearing in 2016. An accretion claim was finally secured in early 2020.

Future

Rising demand and risk

The expected significant increase in the Horowhenua population in coming years along with increasingly easier access to the 23km of highly utilized coast line between the Ohau and Manawatu rivers will continue to raise the risk of drowning at our beaches.

Lifeguard services

Lifeguard services and facilities need to improve and increase to meet the expected demand. Alongside the several 1000 volunteer hours put directly into lifeguard operations each year, lifeguards continue to commit many more hours to training and development, community education programs, emergency call out squads (ECOS) working alongside Coast Guard, SARS, providing water safety at an increasing number of water-based events and working alongside other agency to advance water safety and drowning prevention.

Further to this Clubs operate junior surf programs, where during summer kids ranging in age from 6 – 13 participate in weekly beach and surf development programs. While some of these kids go on to become lifeguards, more importantly they have developed life long beach and surf skills. Not only keeping themselves safe but perhaps one day using those skills to keep others safe.

Our Surf club runs a very successful junior surf program over summer, this year limited to 100 kids. We expect to expand this program once we have a new surf club building.

Levin-Waitarere surf lifesaving club has averaged between 150 – 200 members, 40 - 50 lifeguards and 70 – 100 juniors over the past 5 years.

Surf lifesaving in general and the Levin-Waitarere Club are in a strong position. The Central Government has recently committed around \$9m of annual operational and capital expenditure funding for the next 3 years.

Clubs around New Zealand are being replaced, upgraded and modernised, Lifeguard activities and operations are being improved, professionalised and expanded to meet the growing needs and expectations of communities and the increasing risk of drowning.

Purpose of a Surf Club new building

Our submission is that a new surf club building is needed.

What the public sees is only the tip of the iceberg of the entire ecosystem required to operate a successful and enduring lifeguard service.

The core functions of the surf club are our lifeguard service, junior surf program, sports program, management and administration, training and education.

People – the club is made up of lifeguards, lifeguard leaders, teachers and trainers, managers and administrators, nippers and juniors, family and caregivers.

Equipment – the club requires essential lifeguard equipment such as, IRB's, mobile patrol tower / caravan, mobile patrol vehicles, rescue equipment such as rescue boards, tubes and fins, VHF radios, first aid and lifesaving and resuscitation equipment including AED and oxygen, Lifeguard training equipment plus, extensive equipment for both the Junior surf and sports programs.

Facility – the facility needs to provide storage for lifeguard patrol and training equipment, patrol tower, training areas, first aid and, the full range of amenities for the club's functions, accommodate and be a base for emergency call out squads and SAR activities.

Community – The club is recognised as core to the Waitarere community. We support community groups ranging from local colleges and schools, scouts, sports and youth groups and acts as a community meeting place.

A new surf club building is essential to ensure we can maintain a sustainable and professional lifeguard service while providing a healthy, safe and secure environment for our guards and members, and safeguarding the children and young people in our club and under our care.

The current facility

The current facility fails to meet most if not all the requirements and standards of a modern surf club facility and building. The most critical issues are

- Lack of structural integrity and H&S risk
- We cannot patrol from the clubroom or elevated patrol position.
- The current facility is making it increasingly more difficult to safeguard children and young people in the club.

New facility

We are proposing a new facility located seaward and south of the current building, it will be up to 500m² and can be up to two stories high, and meet the other conditions of the designation approved in 2016 while meeting the current and future needs of modern lifeguard service and surf lifesaving club.

It will primarily be for providing lifeguard services and surf club activity, commercial and private functions are restricted by the designation. It will be designed to allow other community groups to utilise the facility, and for patrols to be operated while other activities can be undertaken in the facility at the same time.

The designation approved in 2016 has a condition that limited the facility to up to 500m². On reviewing this in 2020 compared to current and future needs and expected community growth and demand for services, allowance should be made to expand or add to the new 500m² facility.

Our preference is to proceed with construction at 500m² now, so as not to delay the project, and that the design should allow for additions to easily be made to the building. In the future or in parallel, seek changes or a new designation that would allow additions to be made in a stage two step.

Ownership

Our submission is that the current model of council ownership of the surf club building is maintained for the new building. With the club leasing the building from Council.

The recent decision by the central government to significantly support Lifesaving activities is recognition that this is an essential service to the community and that without this level of support the service is in danger of failing.

For over a century, community members have volunteered their time, skill, knowledge and experience to prevent drowning and save lives. In a **'part of community for the community'** effort.

The proposed ownership recognises the wider community benefit and builds a genuine **‘by the community, for the community’** relationship.

Functionally it also recognises the fact that the clubs core capability is, and should be operating a lifeguard service, whereas the Council has core capability in owning, managing and operating community facilities.

Funding

Our submission is that core cornerstone funding and underwriting of the building project to be undertaken by the Horowhenua District Council.

There is a variety of funding groups nationwide that financially support essential community service projects, such as this. They will fund with knowledge that these projects have funding and support from the local territorial authority.

Other expected sources of funding:

The Surf club - expects to be able to contribute between \$150,000 and \$200,000 from funds the club has already raised and set aside for the project.

Central Government - has provided contestable funding through Surf Lifesaving New Zealand. The club and council officers are preparing an application to seek funding for the new building. Note that HDC was recently successful in securing \$800,000 for the capital works on the Foxton Surf lifesaving club.

Community grant organisation – these have traditionally been a key source of funding for surf club buildings and it can be expected that we will be successful in securing funding.

Individuals, estates and businesses – Surf lifesaving is a highly valued community service and from time to time receives money from individuals, businesses and estates. The club's own building fund has been in part built up from this source of funding and we believe that this can be a source of further funding and support.

If we are successful with securing funds from other sources, then it can be expected that the amount set aside by council in the LTP may not be fully required.

Building operating expenses

Central Government Funding for Surf lifesaving has an operational expenditure component. While the building is owned by council, this could be accessed and reduce the impact of ongoing operating expenses on the council.

Timing

Our submission asks that the allocation of funding be brought forward into year 1 and year 2 of the LTP.

Other than funding there are no major barriers to getting construction underway, our goal is to complete construction by late 2022 / early 2023.

Based upon the draft LTP, funding is allocated in year 3 (23/24), which would see construction not start until later in 2023 and result in completion being pushed out to the 24/25 season.

Funding is now the main impediment to getting the new surf club built.

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New facility

We are proposing a new facility located seaward and south of the current building, it will be up to 500m² and can be up to two stories high, and meet the other conditions of the designation approved in 2016 while meeting the current and future needs of modern lifeguard service and surf lifesaving club.

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The recent decision by the central government to significantly support Lifesaving activities is recognition that this is an essential service to the community and that without this level of support the service is in danger of failing.

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Joint working group

Our submission asks that a joint work group be set up between the HDC and the Surf Club to lead the planning, design and construction of the new surf club.

Unlike many other community facilities, this is primarily for the purpose of providing lifeguard services, much of the design will be specific to the needs of this activity and will come from the experience and knowledge of the clubs and members.

Our members also come from a wide cross section of professions and will bring those skills and knowledge to the project that can be tapped into where required.

Rather than either the club or council going it alone on the design and construction of the building we believe is far better to set up a joint working group between the HDC and the Surf club responsible for the planning, design and construction.

Conclusion

The club has come off our best season yet, the future looks bright. We have a strong organisation and a motivated team ready, willing and able to get on and build our new surf club now.

We would like to have the opportunity to present at the Submission Hearing on the week of 11th May 2021.


Dear Committee



MidCentral **District Health Board's** Public Health Service is responsible for promoting the reduction of adverse environmental effects on the health of people and communities and for improving, promoting and protecting their health pursuant to the New Zealand Public Health and Disability Act 2000 and the Health Act 1956. These statutory obligations are the responsibility of the Ministry of Health and, in the MidCentral District are carried out under delegation by Public Health Services.

Health is influenced by a wide range of factors beyond the health sector and so we are grateful for the opportunity to comment.

The Long Term Plan Consultation Document and the Infrastructure Strategy 2021-2051 note the anticipated cost of work programmes and projects. Where we note support in our submission, we have made no assessment of the adequacy of costings or provided any views about the impact on rates for residents. We have simply indicated our support or recommendations to the proposed options under our statutory obligations.

Key health and wellbeing considerations for the Long term Plan 2021-41

Climate Change

Throughout the Infrastructure Strategy 2021-2051, resilience to the effects of climate change is noted as a rationale underpinning the preferred options. Neither the Infrastructure Strategy 2021-2051 nor the Long Term Plan 2021-2041 Consultation Document state how proposed actions and spending will be sufficient to achieve climate change adaptation or reduction of greenhouse gas emissions. As far as we are aware, Horowhenua District Council (HDC) does not have a comprehensive climate change strategy which means that there are effectively no targets or goals (either for the reduction of greenhouse gas emission or climate change adaptation) that the Long Term Plan and the Infrastructure Strategy can be assessed against. Therefore we cannot adequately assess whether actions proposed to provide resilience to climate change in the consultation documents are adequate to protect public health.

We acknowledge that Horizons Regional Council are still developing the Regional Climate Risk Assessment. That document will not be released prior to the Long Term Plan being finalised. We recommend that HDC acknowledge the limitations of producing a Long Term Plan without a comprehensive climate change strategy based on the regional climate risk assessment to inform that plan. Such an acknowledgement would provide transparency to residents of the limitations of this Long Term Plan with respect to effective climate action. We also acknowledge that central government has yet to set clear climate change targets or regulatory requirements for local authorities.

In the recently released Climate Change Commission Draft Advice for Consultation document¹, we note that the Commission recommends local and central government work together to align legislation and policy to enable local government to make effective decisions for climate change mitigation and adaptation. This includes aligning the Local Government Act, the Building Act and Code, national direction under the RMA, the proposed RMA reforms, implementation of the freshwater management framework and the 30-year infrastructure plan. This recommendation demonstrates that the Climate Change Commission sees local government as a key player in reducing greenhouse gases and increasing resilience to climate change. If adopted, this recommendation signals major change for all Councils and we recommend that Horowhenua District Council plans for these changes.

We note that the Long Term Plan makes scant mention of any strategy or planned action HDC has formulated to reduce its operational greenhouse gas emissions or that any such decision has been made by council. We submit that the Long Term Plan should include measures that HDC intends to undertake to reduce its greenhouse gas emissions and a budgetary allowance for such measures. While the Climate Change Commission Draft Advice is still to be finalised, their initial assessment concludes that New Zealand will not meet its greenhouse gas reduction targets without strong and decisive action now.¹ We submit that the Horowhenua District Council Long Term Plan needs to consider the changes required within the Long Term Plan period to avoid bigger, more disruptive changes in the future as New Zealand is required to reduce its emissions and adapt to the effects of climate change.

Active Transport

While we support the increased budget for cycling and walking, we do not believe it goes far enough. The Land Transport budget is \$316.3 million so the proposed expenditure is less than one percent of the total budget. We note that the climate change commission expects cycling rates to almost double:

“In addition to changing the vehicles we drive, changes to how and how much New Zealanders travel play an important role in our path. We assume the average household travel distance per person can be reduced by around 7% by 2030, for example through more compact urban form and encouraging remote working. We also assume that the share of this distance travelled by walking, cycling and public transport can be increased by 25%, 95% and 120% respectively by 2030.”¹

Increasing active transport substantially will require investment in cycling and walking infrastructure and doing this early will prevent the need for sudden, large, and disruptive changes in investment to cope with these requirements. Active transport has well established health benefits as well as creating minimal greenhouse gas emissions compared to petrol/diesel vehicles. Improved mental health and reduced risk of diseases such as cancer and cardiovascular disease are some benefits.²

Bikes in Schools

We would like Horowhenua District Council to consider how to encourage schools in the district to adopt the Bikes in Schools programme.

Palmerston North City Council has helped ten schools adopt this scheme, and two more will receive funding for this programme in the 2020/2021 financial year. Principals at these have noted that the scheme means that now every child at their school could ride a bike and that for some children bikes in schools were a highlight, with children choosing extra time on a bike in preference to other rewards.

Sugar sweetened beverages policy

We note that a growing number of Councils have adopted a sugar-free beverage policy and Local Government New Zealand passed a remit³ encouraging this in 2017. This policy has not impinged financially on Councils, but has helped promote improved lifestyles to the community. Consumption of sugary drinks has been identified by numerous studies as leading to increased risk of diseases (diabetes, cardiovascular diseases and some cancers). Councils refusing to sell sugary drinks in their buildings and at events helps encourage healthier choices.

We would appreciate the opportunity to address Council for 20 minutes on the sugar sweetened beverages policy.

Local Alcohol Plan

We congratulate Horowhenua District Council on the adoption of the Horowhenua District **Council Local Alcohol Policy and your work to reflect your local communities' character and needs**. This is a commendable effort and puts Horowhenua District Council amongst the local government leaders on this issue. We look forward to being involved in any future reviews.

Foxton Pool

The Foxton Aquatic centre provides multiple opportunities for increased and sustainable physical activity. The Aquatic centre provides the community with the venue for:

- Local schools to partake in swimming sports,
- Swimming lessons for children and teenagers inside and outside of school;
- The community to be able to partake in aquarobics; and
- Summer time leisure for whanau and visitors from outside of the community.

We oppose the loss of the Foxton pool (Option 5) as it would reduce: physical activity; accessibility to swimming in general; and it would decrease the ability for people to learn how to swim safely. Closure of the pool would likely increase risk of drownings at local beaches which offer a more dangerous environment and less access to lifeguards (who patrol a larger area with more people). On the beach it takes more time to get to person in trouble compared to a swimming pool.

Without the Foxton Aquatic Centre the community will have to travel to Levin to go swimming in a pool - making it more difficult for people who are not able to travel long distance due to cost or lack of a car.

The pool also provides the elderly and rehabilitation community with an important opportunity to improve their health and mobility.

We have some reservations around the development of splash pads. Splash pads have two basic designs, non-recirculating or flow-through systems and recirculated systems. Non-recirculating systems, which discharge water directly to wastewater present a low public health risk. Recirculated parks reuse water after some form of treatment and represent an increased risk of contamination and disease transmission. A splash pad at Raumati was suspected by Regional Public Health Service as the likely source of a 2018 cryptosporidiosis outbreak. Should either Option One or Three be chosen, which includes a new splash pad at the Foxton Pool, we recommend if a recirculated system is the chosen design, that it is designed and maintained in a way that reduces the health risk to users.

Infrastructure Strategy

Central/ Local Government Three Waters Reform

We acknowledge that with current legislative change there is uncertainty pertaining to some aspects of water supply and drinking water provision and regulation with the Water Services Bill yet to pass into law. Local Authorities would face significant duties and obligations under the Water Services Bill should it pass into law to give effect to Te Mana o te Wai as well as under the National Policy Statement for Freshwater Management 2020 (NPS-FM) in relation to water supply, stormwater and wastewater management. Complying with new requirements is likely to require significant capital and operating expenditure from local authorities.

Should the Health (Fluoridation of Drinking Water) Amendment Bill pass into law, HDC drinking water supplies would likely also require fluoridation. Based on the proposed Bill, the cost of fluoridation would be borne by the local authority should they be required to fluoridate drinking water, though some central government assistance may be available. The potential requirement for fluoridation of the water supply does not appear to be noted in the consultation document or infrastructure planning.

We submit that HDC should take into account the challenge of future legislation and changing requirements around water treatment. We acknowledge that there is uncertainty with the long-term management and operation of water services with the proposed creation of multiregional entities to deliver three waters functions. We support the rationale that until change is confirmed, three waters services are included in the Long Term plan.

Water Supply

We support the option to improve water source treatment and capacity for Levin on pg. 25 of the Infrastructure Strategy 2021-2051. The critical water shortage experienced by Dannevirke in early 2020 highlights the risk of limitation of supply that can be adversely affected by drought. Effects of climate change on weather patterns increase the risk of drought conditions as mentioned in the Infrastructure Strategy. The provision of an adequate supply of safe drinking water is a critical public health measure. Under the National Policy Statement for Freshwater Management (NPS-FM), after Te Mana o Te Wai,

provision of drinking water takes precedence over other water take uses. We strongly support that HDC prioritises the identification and development of an additional long-term water supply for Levin. An additional drinking water source should take priority over industrial or rural water source usage as per the hierarchy of importance in the National Policy Statement for Freshwater Management (NPS-FM).

We support in part the implementation of a reticulated water supply for both Ōhau and **Waitārere Beach** as noted on pg. 25 of the Infrastructure Strategy 2021-2051. We support the implementation, but not the delay in decision making or commencement of implementation. Rural residents (generally on household, private water supplies) have significantly higher rates of potentially waterborne illnesses than those who live in urban communities whose drinking water is most commonly from a treated public water supply.⁴ Roof water tank supplies are also prone to run out in drought dry weather events. The drought in early 2020 in Northland and northern Auckland saw significant delays in delivery of tankered water so that some residents had to rely on bringing in water regularly from emergency supplies.

1. We recommend that the timeframe for decision making and implementation of **reticulated water supply for Waitārere Beach and Ōhau** are pulled forward so that these communities have reticulated water supply as soon as practically possible.
2. We recommend that the implementation of a reticulated drinking water supply for **Waitārere Beach should occur prior to any additional housing (as proposed in Plan Change 5 and noted in the section 32 report) being built.** Without reticulated supply, all new residences would need their own drinking water supplies and we have concerns about the feasibility of this for both practical and financial reasons. New residences built under that proposed plan change (assuming it is accepted) in the **Waitārere Beach Growth Area should be able to link to reticulated supply at the time of building.**

We support the option for renewal backlog and improved asset condition and asset data collection to improve knowledge of the water supply, treatment and reticulation system. As noted, such measures will minimise the risk of disruption to drinking water supplies by allowing for proactive replacement of assets rather than reactive replacement after asset failure. We also support increasing the resilience in the water network and the progressive replacement of asbestos concrete pipes on pg. 28. Such measures, as stated, provide some mitigation against earthquake damage and also allow for increased capacity where necessary and potentially reducing leaks in the water network.

Wastewater

Ongoing investment in wastewater infrastructure has intergenerational benefits for protection of the environment and for public health. Delays in investment to upgrade current infrastructure not only has implications for breaches of resource consent conditions, but ultimately will transfer the cost to future generations – both in managing the negative environmental impacts and the cumulative costs of delayed maintenance. We agree with the infrastructure strategy in that improved resilience is required with regard to natural hazards and climate change, especially with the challenge of ageing wastewater infrastructure and increased demand with projected growth.

We support the renewal backlog and improved asset condition and asset data collection on pg. 34. Asset assessment can identify required maintenance prior to leakage or asset failure.

Such a strategy minimizes the risk of ingress of wastewater into stormwater networks that can create a public health risk.

We support the development of a Wastewater Masterplan on pg. 35. Given the predicted population growth in the Consultation Document and potential intensification of housing such as proposed in the Taraika growth area, a masterplan is justified to predict future demand and develop a long term strategy for wastewater taking into account recent regulatory changes and new regulation likely to be implemented in the near future.

We support the implementation of a reticulated wastewater system for Ōhau. As per our statement for Ōhau drinking water, we submit that implementation should be as soon as practicable.

We also support the investment in projects to increase resilience of wastewater networks and treatment as noted on pg. 37. We agree that climate change is likely to increase the frequency of both extreme rainfall events and prolonged dry periods that can increase the likelihood of environmental discharge and associated health risks. We support the replacement of asbestos cement piping with more earthquake resilient materials to improve system and plant resilience.

We recommend Council consider where it would be appropriate to extend wastewater reticulation to properties near existing wastewater networks. We submit that Council take a strategic view and determine the viability of extending the urban reticulation to properties on the outskirts of the town boundaries currently on septic tanks. Many of the on-site disposal systems installed in the past do not meet current health and environmental objectives. Wastewater disposal can pose specific risks where the groundwater is the main source of drinking water for the community.

Stormwater

As has been mentioned for wastewater, we also agree that improved resilience of stormwater infrastructure is required, mitigating the public health risk posed by flooding and contamination. We agree that such improvements are required as part of climate change adaptation as the frequency of intense rainfall events is predicted to increase. Stormwater contamination adversely affects water quality, especially in freshwater environments. As well as the potential of such contamination to create a public health risk for users, contaminated stormwater will adversely affect Te Mana o te Wai.

We support in part the use of sustainable green stormwater management in new subdivisions provided that such management minimises the creation of mosquito breeding habitat that could create a nuisance under section 29(q) of the Health Act 1956. Climate change increases the risk of exotic mosquito species of public health significance establishing in New Zealand. We recommend that any sustainable green stormwater management minimise the creation of mosquito breeding habitat where it is practicable.

We support the option on pg. 43 to deliver programmes of work from stormwater catchment management plans to programme improvements to stormwater infrastructure and mitigate flooding risk.

The HDC website notes that the Council intends to undertake a feasibility study to improve the water quality of stormwater entering Lake Horowhenua. We recommend that this should be noted in the Long Term Plan. There is no specific mention of this in the consultation document or the Infrastructure Strategy.

We recommend that specific consideration in the strategy be given to stormwater catchments entering Lake Horowhenua and that the intent to improve the water quality of that stormwater be noted.

Solid Waste

The 2018-2038 Long Term Plan contains a comprehensive section on solid waste. That document noted that HDC had legislative requirements under the Health Act 1956 to provide sanitary works, the Waste Minimisation Act 2008 and The Climate Change Response (Emissions Trading) Amendment Act 2008. It also states that solid waste activity directly supports health and environmental community outcomes. We acknowledge that HDC has a Waste Minimisation Strategy for the period 2018-2024.

The Infrastructure Strategy 2021-2051 notes that solid waste activity is not covered in that strategy due to uncertainty over what assets will be owned or activities managed by HDC. The 2018-2038 Long Term Plan contains detailed forecast funding of solid waste over that 20 year period. Given that solid waste is not included in the proposed Long Term Plan or the Infrastructure Strategy 2021-2051, we are unable to comment on adequacy of planning around solid waste management.

Recommendations

We recommend that Horowhenua District Council:

- Increases planning to reduce emissions and to cope with the effects of Climate Change within its Long Term Plan;
- Increases the budget for infrastructure to increase walking, cycling and use of public transport;
- Encourages the adoption of Bikes in Schools programme in the Horowhenua District;
- Notes our congratulations on adopting the Horowhenua District Council Local Alcohol Policy;
- Adopts a sugar-free beverage policy and notes our offer to come and discuss this policy further;
- Notes the Long Term Plan is not informed by a comprehensive climate change strategy based on the regional climate risk assessment and so the Plan is liable to change.
- Notes that if a splash pad is included in any change to the Foxton Pool and recirculated design is chosen for such a splash pad, then it will need be designed and maintained in a way that reduces the health risk to users.
- Brings forward the timeframe for decision making and implementation of a **reticulated water supply for Waitāreere Beach and Ōhau** so that these communities have reticulated water supply as soon as practically possible. We strongly support the implementation of reticulated water supplies for these communities.
- **Implement a reticulated drinking water supply for Waitāreere Beach** prior to any additional housing being approved to be built on land not currently zoned as residential that would become residential or high density residential zoned land under the proposed plan change 5, **Waitāreere Beach** Growth Area.
- Note the feasibility study of stormwater entering Lake Horowhenua in the Long Term Plan if it falls in that plan's timeframe.

- Give specific consideration to storm water catchments entering Lake Horowhenua to improve the water quality of the lake.

Increase p/a of \$515.25 divided by \$1219.39 x 100 = 42.3% increase in rates.

This is higher than rural commercial rate increase of 31.7%

Why?

Back in 2005, I chose this property of 1.3717 h to realise my dream of increasing the Kunekune population and since 2015 have bred many pure-bred litters of Kunekune. I was raised in the King Country on a dry stock farm and have a farming background. The soil quality here is nil, based on the mere 2-5cm of topsoil on the sand, and the high-water table. It is unsuitable for a herd, but the Kunekune has survived well with supplement feed. There are a couple of sheep (which are soon to leave because of age), a horse and chooks as pets.

I have enhanced the paddock by planting numerous native trees. There is no water supply, so I have a Devon water tank that is filled up by Reggie. The property is working towards organic.

You consider my property, empty, I am not a real farmer of acreage that I must till, seed, or milk with major infrastructure. I only manage the feeding, grazing rotation, maintain fences and weeds, facial eczema, shearing, vaccinations, health of the animal. I spend my money, looking after these animals, in the Horowhenua, and have always supported local businesses. I am farming pure bred Kunekune pigs (and have done so for the 16 years that I have owned this property.)

I am not opposed to rate increases and understand where the money is spent but your plan to change being changed to "farming DIFFERENTIALS" raises my rates by 42.3%. This is radical and unjust compared to other rate increases. For this reason, I am opposed to the farming DIFFERENTIALS.

Being rated as Lifestyle would be more appropriate for this property.

Financial Strategy

To deliver the projects and services planned over the next 20 years, we are proposing the limit on annual rates increases to range between 4.6% and 7.5% per year for the first 10 years, with an average of 4.4% for the following 10 years. We are also proposing to increase our net debt limit from 195% to 250% of our operating income. 

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



Speed is NOT the big evil it is set out to be. Incompetent driving is a much bigger issue. The "statistics" around speed are false. Of course speed is a factor in all crashes - at least one vehicle must be moving at SOME speed before there can be a crash. That does no mean speed was the cause of the crash. Drivers frequently do not tell the trust about the actual cause of a crash - why would they? the whole criminal "justice" system encourages them to lye - and there is no penalty for them doing so. Of course the Police must make out that speed is the big evil. They need to justify the revenue gathering from speed cameras. If they really wanted to slow traffic down they would put up signs warning of a speed camera ahead. Every roading initiative seems to be aimed at slowing traffic down. Slowing traffic down causes crashes. For every 10% of speed reduction you increase the amount of traffic on the road concerned by 10%. Drivers are still going to go to the same places but !0% slower therefore on the road for 10% longer, that is 10% more traffic on the road congesting them and MORE likely to have crashes. I am a cyclist and motorcyclist. I know that the longer I spend on the roads the more likely it is that some incompetent driver is going to kill me. Please try to keep traffic flowing - not slowing. Please feel free to contact me about how to increase driver competence. I acknowledge that is a national problem not necessarily a local council one.
