Adventure Park

93 OXFORD STREET

A family park with play equipment for all ages – including tumbling drums, ropes course, climbing wall, fitness trail, mini-ball court, skating area, sand volleyball court, disability swing, Bocce courts and a separate dog rest/ exercise area. No dogs except in dog exercise area.

Donnelly Park

ADKIN AVENUE

One of our premier sports parks, Donnelly Park has grass and artificial fields, cricket wickets, netball courts, soccer fields and a private hockey stadium. A popular spot for sports tournaments, training and other events. No dogs.

Jubilee Park

CORNER BATH AND PARKER STREETS

Known by locals as the 'Donald Duck Park' after its Disney-lookalike characters, Jubilee Park is a great spot to take children, with a playground, splash pad, BBQ and shady trees. No dogs.

Kimberley Reserve

EAST KIMBERLEY ROAD

Nestled in a bush setting next to the Ōhau River with swimming holes and walking tracks nearby. Enjoy a picnic, play cricket, touch rugby or take the dog for a walk. Dogs allowed off leash but must be under control and kept away from swimmers/bush. Closes for winter.

Kohitere Trig Walkway 30 DENTON ROAD

Features walking and mountain biking tracks and access to Tararua Forest Park. The top ridge trig offers outstanding views on a clear day. Closed until mid 2024 for forestry work*. Alternative access to the summit of Trig is available via the Grey Bush Track on Gladstone Road.

Kowhai Park

191 QUEEN STREET WEST

A popular off-leash dog exercise spot known locally as 'the dog park'. It's also the site of a native bush restoration project. Large open areas, short walks and sheltered spots.



Lake Papaitonga Scenic Reserve

END OF BULLER ROAD

A dune lake rich in cultural and natural history, surrounded by 135 hectares of wetlands and coastal forests. Managed by the Department of Conservation, this reserve is a refuge for birds. No dogs.




Muaūpoko Park (Lake Horowhenua)

END OF QUEEN STREET WEST

Offering great views over Lake Horowhenua (Punahau), Muaūpoko Park is a landscaped area of parkland with a playground. A variety of bird life visits the lake. Dogs only allowed in designated Agility/Obedience Club areas. No swimming or boating. Closed between sunset and sunrise.

Remembrance Park/ Thompson House Gardens/ Nola Simpson Rose Gardens and Levin Courthouse

CORNER CAMBRIDGE AND BATH STREETS/KENT STREET/ CAMBRIDGE STREET

These three neighbouring parks each have special significance. Remembrance Park is the home of Levin's war memorial Cenotaph and commemorative 'poppy boxes', which light up at night. Walk through to Thompson House Gardens, a Green Flag award-winning park containing historic Thompson House. Across Cambridge Street you'll find the aromatic Nola Simpson Rose Gardens, which house the historic Levin Courthouse. Dogs permitted on leash in Thompson House Gardens and Nola Simpson Rose Gardens. No dogs in Remembrance Park.

Village Green Levin

CORNER OF QUEEN AND SALISBURY STREETS

This park in the heart of Levin is adjacent to the Levin Skate Park and Levin Memorial Hall. There are cafés nearby in the surrounding shopping area and public toilets across the road. Dogs on leash, outside shop trading hours only.

Waiopehu Reserve

1154 QUEEN ST EAST

Native podocarp bush reserve with some large old rimu trees and a meandering stream, just five minutes' drive from central Levin. No dogs.

Foxton

Paretao/Seaview Gardens

CORNER OF UNION AND HARBOUR STREETS

Historic, elevated garden with walkways up to Foxton's landmark 1923 water tower. The park boasts short walks and views up Foxton Main Street and out to the Manawatū Estuary. Dogs on leash, outside shop trading hours only.

Te Awahou Riverside Cultural Park

MAIN STREET

The Te Awahou Riverside Cultural Park surrounds Foxton's community hub, Te Awahou Nieuwe Stroom, which houses Maōri and Dutch museums, galleries, library and café. The park also boasts de Molen, a working full-size Dutch windmill, the Flax Stripper Museum, Whare Manaaki Māori Gallery and Workshop, Foxton's horse drawn tram and the Dutch Oven Café. Dogs on leash, outside shop trading hours only.

Cousins Reserve

COUSINS RESERVE

An old plantation forest with walking and mountain biking tracks, trails through the rear dunes and open grassed areas. A short walk from the beach.

WAIKAWA BEACH ROAD

A perfect family picnic spot by the Waikawa Stream, Hank Edwards Reserve has picnic tables, a basketball hoop, a BBQ, playground, changing rooms and an outdoor shower for after a swim. Dogs must be on leash in the reserve, but can run free on the beach.

CORNER MOKENA KOHERE AND HONI TAIPUA STREETS

A pretty spot just off the State Highway, this Green Flag awarded reserve has shade trees, camellia gardens, seating and small but beautifully kept gardens and lawns. Driscoll Reserve is the perfect place to stop for a stretch and a cuppa.

Holben Reserve

CORNERS OF SEABURY AVENUE, HOLBEN PARADE AND NASH PARADE

Holben Reserve offers ponds, a playground, a bike skills area, a pump track, skate park, basketball hoops and picnic spots. The reserve is an easy walk to the Ramsar-protected Manawatū Estuary, which offers some of the best bird-watching in the district. No dogs.

Mangahao White Water Park is a world class kayaking venue. The area is also a gateway for mountain biking and hiking in the Tararua Forest Park.

An extensive sports ground with grandstand, public hall, skate park and courts, Shannon Domain is regularly used for both winter and summer sports. No dogs.

Horseshoe Bend Reserve

Horseshoe Bend is a popular swimming spot. There are bush walks and swimming holes, and established trees make this a good spot to enjoy a picnic. Closed in winter. No dogs.

TIPS FROM THE LOCALS

There are many hidden gems around Horowhenua. Always allow more time than you think you'll need to enjoy our parks and reserves and immerse yourself in your surroundings.

Jubilee Park (affectionately known as the 'Donald Duck Park') is fully fenced and very popular with locals – even more so since late 2022 when a splash pad and new changing rooms were added.

Levin's Adventure Park caters to a range of ages – there's dedicated areas for pre-schoolers, dogs, older children, plenty of seating, a miniature train which runs during the school holidays and weekends, BBQs and a kiosk pavilion that provides instant hot water for hot drinks, a microwave for heating food, and tables and chairs inside.

Kowhai Park at 191 Queen Street, Levin is a popular spot for dog lovers. Enjoy a view of the lake while walking your dog. There are large open areas as well as short walks and more sheltered spots for off-leash fun.

Waitārere Beach

Waitārere Beach is a wide, sandy beach about 10 minutes' drive north of Levin. It's a good spot for swimming, fishing, walking and other beach activities such as horse riding and land yachts. Explore the site of the Hydrabad shipwreck or visit the charming community of Waitārere Beach, and enjoy the hospitality on offer. The beach is patrolled by Surf Lifesavers in summer, and toilet facilities are available. A new Waitārere Beach Surf Life Saving Community Facility is set to open in late 2023. Dogs are allowed off leash in most areas.

Foxton Beach

Foxton Beach is five kilometres west of Foxton. It's the largest coastal community in Horowhenua and there's plenty to do including fishing, kite sports, land yachting, surfing, paddle boarding and swimming. The Ramsarprotected international wetland at the Manawatū River estuary regularly draws birdwatchers. There are also nearby walkways, cycleways, cafés, parks and reserves to enjoy. Toilet facilities are available. Dogs are allowed off leash in most areas.

Hōkio Beach

Hōkio Beach is a sandy beach nine kilometres from Levin. It offers expansive views north and south and you can see Mt Ruapehu and Mt Taranaki on a clear day. Walk up the coast to Waitārere Beach, or enjoy the playground, picnic area and barbeque in the park at the entrance to the beach. Toilet facilities are available. Dogs are allowed off leash except in fenced play areas.

Waikawa Beach

Waikawa Beach, situated 15 minutes south of Levin, is the perfect place for kayaking, swimming and horse riding. The nearby Hank Edwards Reserve offers picnic spots and a children's playground. Dogs must be on a leash in the reserve, but are allowed off leash on the beach.



Accessibility

Horowhenua has a number of disability accessible playgrounds, with a wheelchair swing at Levin Adventure Park. Of the 28 standalone public toilets in Horowhenua, 21 are accessible. Our aquatics facilities provide wheelchairs, a chairlift which can provide access into the pool via a seat, sling or hoist for the aqua wheelchair, and changing rooms for people with disabilities. Horowhenua also has a wheelchair accessible splash pad.

Two Hippocampe all terrain beach wheelchairs, two Sandcruiser beach wheelchairs and two WheelEEZ® all terrain rollators are available to people with disabilities to use for free so they can explore our beautiful parks and beaches. Te Takeretanga o Kura-hau-pō

Te Takeretanga o Kura-hau-pō is Levin's community centre and library, which offers an extensive collection of books, magazines, jigsaws, audiovisual material, special collections, e-newspapers, e-books, and online databases. Library membership is free for Horowhenua residents.

The community centre also houses the Youth Space, a versatile space for young people aged between 12 and 24 to hang out and enjoy a variety of youth-oriented events, activities and programmes. Youth Space has plenty of things to enjoy, including a basketball hoop, games, a multi-sport interactive wall, a recording studio and more. Youth Space is a safe and supportive environment for young people.

AA driver and vehicle licensing services are available, and an i-SITE in the centre is a great place to go for current event information and local insights. The i-SITE also often arranges day trips to special events and exhibitions outside the district.

Te Takeretanga o Kura-hau-pō is the heart of the Levin community, with a busy programme of special events, concerts, presentations, activities, workshops and exhibitions.

The centre offers free Wi-Fi and bookable meeting spaces.

Te Awahou Nieuwe Stroom


The award winning Te Awahou Nieuwe Stroom is at the heart of Te Awahou Riverside Cultural Park. The multicultural community and visitor facility is dedicated to the preservation and development of the cultural, social and economic heritage of Horowhenua. Te Awahou Nieuwe Stroom houses a museum that tells the stories of Mana Whenua, Aotearoa's national Dutch Immigrants museum, an art gallery with exciting exhibitions, a library, Council's customer service centre, an i-SITE visitor information centre, and bookable meeting rooms. A serene gateway to attractions, art and heritage in a beautiful natural setting, our Cultural Park also features a flax stripper museum telling the story of Foxton's illustrious past, two cafés, a 30m high operational Dutch windmill De Molen (which has a Dutch Deli and is open for tours), and connects to the Foxton River Loop leading to BBQs and a playground.

Te utu i ö reiti Paying your rates

Rates are Horowhenua District Council's main form of income and are used to run and maintain the facilities and services we enjoy in the community.

Horowhenua District Council sets two sorts of rates: targeted rates, which fund specific activities, and general rates, which fund everything else.

TARGETED RATES FUND:

- solid waste disposal
- water supply
- wastewater disposal
- · land transport (roading)
- stormwater
- library services and community centres
- representation and community leadership; and
- aquatic centres (swimming pools).

GENERAL RATES FUND:

- Regulatory Services (liquor, health and safety licensing, building consents, resource consents, animal control, parking enforcement, and general regulatory services);
- Community Facilities and Services, except Library and Community Centres and Aquatic Centres (passive reserves, street beautification, sports grounds,

cemeteries, halls and community buildings, and public toilets);

- Community Support (emergency management, community engagement, visitor information, and economic development);
- Governance and Community Leadership for the activities of Strategic Planning and District Plan development only;
- Property (commercial property, general property, Council buildings); and
- Treasury activities (investment and borrowing activities).

As Horowhenua is part of the Horizons region, you'll need to also pay rates separately to the Horizons Regional Council who manage the region's natural resources, lead regional land transport planning, contract passenger transport services, and coordinate our region's response to natural disasters and emergencies. You can find information about Horizons Regional Council rates at horizons.govt.nz/ property-rates.

RATES REBATES

Rates rebates may be available to eligible residential ratepayers. To be eligible, you must be:

- named as a ratepayer for the property, and;
- living at the property on 1 July of the previous year.

Rebates are based on total household income for the tax year ending 31 March and the amount of rates for both Horowhenua District Council and your regional council.

To check your entitlement, visit the 'Getting a rates rebate' page on the New Zealand Government website www.govt.nz and enter your details into the rebate calculator.

RATING DATABASE

You can view our Rating Information Database online at ratesinformation. horowhenua.govt.nz. Using this link you'll also find land and capital values, and the legal description of a property by using a Street Address or valuation number.

PROPERTY REVALUATION

A rating valuation is a three-yearly assessment of a property's value. Determined by house sale prices on a specific date, Councils use these valuations as a guide for setting your rates.

Revaluations are required by law and we do them because we want to set property rates fairly.

As property values are always moving we need to update our rates distribution to maintain fairness. You can learn more about revaluations by visiting horowhenua.govt.nz/revaluations

It is important to quote your rates assessment number (starting with 1-xxxxx) in the reference field so we can locate your payment.

Setting up a direct debit is a handy way to spread the cost, with payments able to be set up weekly, fortnightly or monthly, as well as quarterly. If you've bought a new home and previously had a direct debit set up, you'll need to complete a new direct debit form and cancel the old one. Te para me te hangarua Rubbish and Recycling

Horowhenua District Council provides a kerbside rubbish bag collection service across the district, and waste transfer stations in Foxton and Shannon.

We also have a kerbside recycling collection service, six permanent recycling stations, and two summer recycling stations.

Council rubbish bags and recycling bins and crates

You can buy Council rubbish bags from our customer service centres (see p.3), supermarkets, and some other shops such as dairies – you might need to ask for them at the counter.

Purchasing Council rubbish bags supports other Council initiatives diverting from landfill.

Your property should come with a Council owned green and yellow wheelie bin and a 55L green recycling crate for your kerbside recycling collection. Use the wheelie bin for recycling paper, cardboard, hard plastics and cans. Use the crate to recycle glass bottles and jars. If your property's wheelie bin or crate is missing, please contact us.

Kerbside rubbish and recycling days

Rubbish is collected weekly, and recycling is collected every two weeks. Rubbish and recycling are collected on the same day of the week.

Some properties have no Council kerbside collection services or have special arrangements because they have few houses or the road conditions make collecting too dangerous. What goes where

Let's produce as little rubbish as possible. All waste, even recycled materials, have an impact on our environment. This "What Goes Where" for rubbish and recycling will help you get your household waste products to where they need to be.

Recycling

These items can go in your Recycling Wheelie Bin (please make sure all items are empty and clean):

- Number 1 plastics: Soft drink, juice & water bottles
- Number 2 plastics: Milk, bathroom & laundry products bottles

- Number 5 plastics: Large yoghurt and ice cream tubs, margarine/ butter tubs, some takeaway containers, and janitorial bottles
- Aluminium cans
- Steel food tins and cans
- Cardboard (Excluding pizza boxes)
- Paper/Newspaper/Junk mail

Don't forget to wash and remove lids. Lids go in your rubbish bag. Non-recyclable materials go in your council bag or waste bin. Getting it wrong could mean that your wheelie bin is not emptied as the contents might endanger staff, break machinery or contaminate other recyclables causing them to be disposed of in a landfill. Glass bottles and food jars (with their lids removed) go in your green crate which is collected at the same time as your Recycling Wheelie Bin. Please stack bottles so that they won't tumble out of the crate.

Contact us if you need a wheelie bin and we will organise delivery to your property. Glass crates can be picked up from council offices.

Please note: deliveries of recycling wheelie bins can take up to a month to be delivered depending on availability.

Food waste

There are currently no kerbside food waste collection services in Horowhenua. Food scraps can be home composted, placed in a worm farm, or disposed of through our Council Kerbside Rubbish Collection service.

Green waste

Green waste can be taken to the Foxton and Shannon Transfer Stations or composted at home. If green waste gets in with the recycling, it becomes a contaminant and it adversely affects the recycling process. Green waste and garden waste can also get tangled up in our machinery and cause damage, this is also a danger to staff.

Council rubbish bags

Items not listed above can go in Council rubbish bags. Please wrap any broken glass or lightbulbs in newspaper before putting them in your bag.

Please do not put the following in your Council rubbish bag:

- Wet cell, Lithium, or rechargeable batteries (These are one of the major causes of landfill fires and need to be disposed of appropriately at your local refuse transfer station)
- Fluorescent lights
- Hazardous Waste / Household chemicals/ Oil
- Items over 10kg

We provide on and off-street parking in Horowhenua including metered areas, time-restricted areas, unrestricted, and all-day parking.

All-day car parking is available on the corner of Salisbury and Bath Streets in Levin, and you can park for free with time limitations in the Levin Mall Car Park on Salisbury Street.

Metered parking areas are on Oxford Street, Bath Street, Chamberlain Street, Queen Street East and West, and the Central Service and North Service lanes.

On weekends and public holidays the metered car parks are free. For further details of metered and time-restricted parking areas, visit: horowhenua.govt.nz/ Services/Parking

Motorists displaying a valid Mobility Parking Permit are entitled to double the parking time paid for per space. The time concession starts following your initial payment in a metered space and applies to non-metered spaces as well. This does not include short-term parks such as P5, P10, P15, P30 and Loading Zones.

In addition, mobility car parks are strategically placed around the Levin Central Business District (CBD) and there are a number of these in the Levin Mall Car Park and two in The Warehouse Car Park. There are no time restrictions on, or a need to pay, when using our mobility car parks. There are a number of cycle stands free to use across the district.

Dog Owners' Information

Dogs are a major source of enjoyment and companionship, but owning a dog means certain responsibilities for you towards the public and the dog itself. Our Dog Owners' Information Manual provides all the basic information and advice on owning a dog in Horowhenua and is available free online or in print from the Civic Building.

Dog exercise areas

We provide a range of designated dog areas where you can exercise your dog off the leash, including most beach areas and many parks and reserves. There are a number of parks and reserves, and some areas at the beach, where dogs are permitted on a leash. See Parks and Reserves (see p.10) for details of the parks where you can exercise your dog, or check the Exercising Your Dog page of our website.

Dogs are not permitted in Levin, Foxton and Shannon town centres during shop trading hours. Outside shop trading hours, and in other residential streets, your dog is permitted on a leash.

Dog registration

Registration fees help Council to cover the costs of providing Animal Control Services and to ensure we are meeting our obligations under the Dog Control Act. The fees cover about three-quarters of the cost to run our Animal Services department, as well as action complaints, pay for education programmes and material, pound facilities, and legal costs. The Dog Control Act sets the rules on when to register your dog. You need to register your dog:

- \cdot when you move to Horowhenua
- \cdot when you first get him or her
- when your puppy turns three months old
- annually after the first registration.

Our registration year runs from 1 July to 30 June the following year. Once you have registered your dog for the first time, we will send you a reminder every year when it is time to renew your registration. You have until 31 July to pay for a re-registration. Fee payments made after 31 July will incur a 50% late fee penalty payment. Current registration fees are available on the Animal Control Fees and Charges page of Council's website.

Animal control

Our Animal Control team is responsible for ensuring animals are looked after and are not menacing or a nuisance to the public. The Animal Control team is available 7 days a week by phoning 06 366 0999. We respond to urgent afterhours callouts and follow up on non-urgent matters the next day during business hours.

Dog pound

Owners of impounded dogs can make an appointment to collect their pets by phoning Council on (06) 366 0999. Depending on circumstances, Animal Control will arrange a time for you to pick up your dog.
