Did you know?

Ōpiki, now made up of a predominantly farming community, was once renowned for its plentiful flax production and a myriad of tram tracks. Trams would cart flax to one of the forty odd flax mills located across the district. Remnants of the swing bridge built in 1917, are now a heritage site and are the last remaining reminder of this era.

OUR LOCAL IWI

Muaūpoko - Ngai Tara o Mua Ūpoko o te Ika a Maui

Muaūpoko are the descendants of Tara, the ancestor of the Ngāi Tara tribe, and a great, great grandson of Kupe of the Matahourua waka and a son of Whatonga of the Kurahaupō waka. He and their descendants discovered. explored and named places throughout Aotearoa, and these remain on the land, coast and sea today, most notably Te Whanganui ā-Tara (Wellington) and the Tararua Ranges, Te Waewae Kāpiti Ko Tara rāua Ko Tautoki (Rangitāne). Muaūpoko - also known as Ngāi Tara o Mua Ūpoko o te Ika a Maui - developed as a separate and unique iwi over time and established its own hapu, areas of occupation, use and access to resources from the western side of the Remutaka and Tararua Ranges to Te Whanganui ā-Tara (Wellington), Porirua, Kāpiti Coast, Horowhenua, Manawatū to Rangitīkei. One source for the origin of the tribal name Muaūpoko is derived from living at the head of the fish.

Muaūpoko has shared ancestry, history, occupation and alliances with Ngāi Tara, Ngāti Rangi, Ngāti Ira, Rangitāne, Ngāti Kahungunu, Ngāti Apa, Taranaki and Whanganui lwi within this area.

In the 1820s through to the 1860s various iwi from Kāwhia, Taranaki and the Maungatautari districts

migrated and settled in these areas. The historical area of interest remains from the Rangitīkei River to Turakirae, with the largest population concentration in the Horowhenua area. Muaūpoko people have various land trusts under Te Whenua Act; a significant ownership trust is the Lake Horowhenua Trust which has private ownership of one of four privately owned lakes in Aotearoa - (Wai punahau).

The Muaūpoko Tribal Authority (MTA), based in Levin, was established in 1997 as an Incorporated Society to protect Muaūpoko identity, assets and to build a stronger economic, social and cultural base for the Muaūpoko

MTA has continued to support Muaūpoko iwi aspirations in all spheres of life. MTA provides a range of services including:

- 1. Leadership, advocacy and representation
- 2. Iwi, hapū, whānau and marae development
- 3. Iwi registration
- 4. Project management and administration and Land owner support
- 5. Treaty Settlements
- 6. Fisheries
- 7. Community services.





Te Awahou Nieuwe Stroom, Foxton

Ngāti Raukawa ki te Tonga

Raukawa is an aromatic plant, which Māhinaarangi used as perfume for her nightly rendezvous with her Tainui lover, Tūrongo. They named their son, the ancestor of Ngāti Raukawa, after the plant.

After facing endless battles over land with Waikato tribes, Ngāti Raukawa began the first of three migrations south, encouraged by Ngāti Toarangatira Chief, Te Rauparaha. The result of this means Ngāti Raukawa have two traditional homelands. The first, in the southern Waikato and northern Taupō districts, centres on Maungatautari, the ancestral mountain of Ngāti Raukawa. The second region is Ngāti Raukawa ki te Tonga – Ngāti Raukawa of the south. It stretches from the Rangitīkei River, west of Manawatū, to Kukutauaki Stream just north of Waikanae.

A large group of Ngāti Raukawa migrated there from the first region in the early decades of the 19th century. In 1975, Ngāti Raukawa initiated a 25-year tribal development plan entitled 'Whakatupuranga rua mano - Generation 2000' which saw the widespread revitalisation of marae and the Māori language, and the establishment of Te Wānanga o Raukawa, the tribe's centre of higher learning in Ōtaki. Ngāti Raukawa people are involved in a wide range of pursuits, including the arts, sciences, business and the reconstruction of Māori knowledge. Ōtaki is a centre of Ngāti Raukawa culture, with Raukawa marae, the beautifully restored Rangiātea Church of Te Rauparaha, and the tribal centre of higher learning, Te Wānanga o Raukawa.







Rangitāne O Manawatū

Rangitāne O Manawatū are descendants of Whātonga, a Chief of the Kurahaupō waka that landed at Māhia Peninsula on the East Coast of the North Island. The tribe take their name from Whātonga grandson, Rangitāne (also known as Tānenui-a-rangi).

Rangitāne occupy Manawatū, Tāmaki nui-a-Rua (present-day Dannevirke), Wairarapa, Te Whanganui-a-Tara (Wellington), and Wairau in the South Island. In terms of settlement in the Manawatū Rangitāne settled around the Manawatū Awa with settlements all along the River from Te Āpiti, in the north, to the junction of the Pohangina and Manawatū Rivers and the confluence of the Oroua and Manawatū Rivers down to Te Awahou (Foxton). Settlements also existed around the mouth of the Manawatū River where it became one with the sea.

Rangitāne occupation of the Manawatū and Horowhenua districts continues today with a strong connection to its many cultural sites and landscapes. Rangitāne O Manawatū hapū are Ngāti Hineaute, Ngāti Kapuarangi, Ngāti Rangitepaia, Ngāti Mairehau, Ngāti Rangiaranaki and Ngāti Tauira.

Rangitāne had strong rangatira who fought tirelessly for the ongoing survival of Rangitāne O Manawatū and helped the tribe adjust to change in the 19th century.

Rangitāne O Manawatū is today represented by a number of entities including Tanenuiarangi Manawatū Incorporated (TMI), Ngāti Hineuate Hapū Authority, Rangimārie Marae.

Rangitāne O Manawatū settled their Treaty Claims in 2016. Rangitāne O Manawatū Settlement Trust is the post-settlement governance entity that received, holds and manages the settlement. They also have an investment arm Rangitāne O Manawatū Investment Trust and their cultural arm Rangitāne O Manawatū Cultural Trust that manages the cultural part of the settlement.

MOUNTAIN BIKING TRAILS

Whether you're a hiking, mountain biking or trail running enthusiast, Horowhenua has it all.

Burtton's Track

Burtton's Track is the perfect spot for advanced riders. The grade 5-6 track is best ridden in dry conditions from north to south and includes some river crossings. You should allow 4-6 hours for the trip and avoid cycling in wet conditions.

Hartley Street Reserve and Sunset Walkway

Located on the banks of the Manawatū River, Hartley Street Reserve walkway passes by the Manawatū Estuary and leads all the way out to the Manawatū River mouth.

Jubilee Park



WALKS AND TRAILS

With the Tararua Forest Park right at our doorstep, as well as river, lake, beach and forest walks, and part of the famous Te Araroa Trail - you'll find walks and trails to suit all ages and abilities in our rohe (district). Check out some of our more challenging routes below!

Waiopehu Hut

A challenging but exhilarating hike for overnight trampers and located at 900 metres elevation in the Tararua Forest Park, the walk to Waiopehu Hut is not for the faint-hearted.

Burtton's Track (Scotts Road to Mangahao Road)

Covering 17 kilometres of scenic countryside and bush, this historic walk involves several stream crossings and is part of the national Te Araroa Trail.

Mangahao - Makahika Track

Also joining into the national Te Araroa Trail, this tramping track covers 15 kilometres of scenic countryside and bush between Palmerston North and Shannon, and includes the Arapaepae Lookout Trail near Levin.

Kohitere Trig

Situated on private land, this track offers both walking and mountain biking tracks, plus access to the Tararua Forest Park. Strike the weather right, and you may see all the way from the South Island to Mount Ruapehu.

The walkway is temporarily closed from 9 January 2023 to mid-2024. There is alternative access to the summit of Trig via Grey Bush Track on Gladstone Road.


Tararua Northern Crossing

CHILL OUT AT THE BEACH

From the quaint Hōkio and Waikawa beaches in the south, to Waitārere and Foxton Beach in the north – you'll find plenty of charming seaside villages and lovely swimming beaches along the expansive Horowhenua coastline.

Foxton Beach

Foxton Beach is the largest coastal community in Horowhenua with parks, playgrounds and some great fish 'n' chips.

Waitārere Beach

Unspoilt views and its very own buried shipwreck make Waitārere Beach one of the best-kept secrets of the North Island's west coast. With a lovely swimming beach and good fishing, this is the place to go when you want to get away from it all.

Hōkio Beach

Just south of Levin you'll find spectacular views at Hōkio Beach. On clear days, you may be lucky enough to see all the way from Kāpiti Island to Mount Ruapehu or Mount Taranaki. If you like a challenge and time the tides right, heading north down the beach for approximately 13-15 km you'll find the Manawatū River too!

Waikawa Beach

With kayaking, swimming and horse riding, and the nearby Hank Edwards Reserve offering picnic spots and a children's playground - Waikawa Beach is the perfect place for a family-friendly weekend away.

Did you know?

The original name for Hōkio is actually Hōkioi – named after Te Hōkioi or the ancestor of the Haast eagle. The native bird, nicknamed the man-eater, also hunted moa, with black feathers tinged with yellow and green and red feathers on top of its head.





TAKE A DIP IN THE LOCAL AWA (RIVER)

Horowhenua is a district of converging environments. Bordered by the Ohau and Manawatū rivers, the land flows all the way from the majestic Tararua Ranges to the Tasman Sea.

UNCOVER THE HISTORY OF OUR LAKES

Punahau - Lake Horowhenua

A shallow lake on a sandy plain two kilometres to the west of Levin and five kilometres from the coast.

Punahau was once surrounded by podocarp forest as the centre of a rich wetland ecosystem. Today the trees are gone, the wetland has been substantially drained and the water quality very poor. Local lwi, the Horowhenua Lake Trust, Horizons Regional Council and Horowhenua District Council are actively attempting to restore the wetland system (that also contains the smaller Waiwiri - Lake Papaitonga) to its former state as a conservation area.

Waiwiri - Lake Papaitonga

Take a family-friendly walk, enjoy the views, and discover a unique part of Horowhenua history at Lake Papaitonga. An ideal spot for a picnic and some bird watching, this dune lake is a refuge for birds that depend on wetlands or lowland forests for their survival.

WATCH OUR WILDLIFE

Manawatū River Estuary

The Manawatū River Estuary is a UNESCO protected and internationally significant wetland (RAMSAR site), famed for its birdlife. The largest estuary in the southern half of the North Island, every year it welcomes and farewells migratory guests from all around the world, including a flock of godwits in summer.


